Background on New Zealand



- 4.2 million people
- 270,000 sq kms land area
- 68% European, 15% Maori, 9% Asian,
 7% Pacific Islanders, 1% other
- Parliamentary elections every 3 years
- 2 official languages English and Maori





Background on New Zealand



- First Maori (indigenous people) in NZ 700 years ago
- First European explorers 1642 & 1769
- New Zealand economy agricultural exports, tourism
- 1/3 of NZ is protected conservation areas







New Zealand does not have many close neighbours

Australia is our nearest partner for business and trade

Lots of collaboration



- Because of our size and location, we collaborate with countries across the Pacific region on projects
- Working with Australia gives us access to a larger infrastructure
- For many Pacific island countries, working with NZ gives them access to our larger infrastructure

Partnership with Australia



ANZLIC - the Australia New Zealand Spatial **Information Council** and the CRCSI -Cooperative Research Centre for Spatial Information are two of our key partnerships with Australia







Spatial market place



- Single, consistent platform
- Internet-based hub of location-based data products, services and processes
- Drive efficiencies, productivity and innovation
- Easier to publish, discover and use information

- NZ on Pacific rim prone to natural events
- Need to coordinate across Pacific for management of natural events
