Preamble

This three-day workshop is a peer-to-peer learning event to raise and improve awareness, knowledge and understanding of the Integrated Geospatial Information Framework (IGIF), to introduce, inform and work through with participants from UN-GGIM: Africa the implementation guidance, the conceptual approach and available resource materials to operationalize the IGIF according to national circumstances. The conceptual approach to operationalize the IGIF included a series of tasks to support the preparation of an execution plan that leads towards the development of a country-level action plan for integrated geospatial information management.

This International Workshop seeks to contribute to the strengthening of nationally integrated geospatial information management towards the producing, disseminating and applying of geospatial information for national strategic and development priorities and the implementation of the 2030 Agenda for Sustainable Development. It will address the operationalization of the IGIF vis-à-vis the evolvement of national spatial data infrastructures, 'leapfrogging' to achieve digital transformation, and to bridge the geospatial digital divide.
